4-H Volunteer Recruitment Resources

National 4-H Council and 4-H National Headquarters recently and jointly conducted and analyzed volunteer segmentation research. This research helps identify target groups who are more likely to volunteer for 4-H. Recently confirmed Monsanto funding and, as of Jan. 2012, there are funds to continue developing tools in response to this research. 4-H National Headquarters will provide input and facilitate input from across the LGU system as these materials are developed. Anticipate receiving these materials by the 2012 NAE4-HA conference. In addition to NAE4-HA, webinars will be presented to distribute the materials and train on usage. Please reserve time on field staff in-service agendas, from Nov. 2012–Mar. 2013, to train field staff on the use of these materials. Some of the tools you can expect to see include:

- Volunteer recruitment brochures (national and adaptable)
- Customizable volunteer recruitment ads
- Volunteer recruitment video
- A series of FAQ's for staff and volunteers who recruit volunteers and for potential volunteers
- A prepared presentation that can be adapted for local use
- Webinar trainings on the tools and their use

The volunteer recruitment campaign will be heavily tied into the volunteer segmentation research referenced above. There will also be ties to the Revolution of Responsibility campaign.

The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) have updated the [Statistical Briefing Book's](#) (SBB's) [data analysis tools](#). These tools give users quick and easy access to detailed statistics on a variety of juvenile justice topics and allow them to create tables on juvenile populations, arrests, court cases, and custody populations.

The SBB offers easy access to a wealth of information about juvenile crime and victimization and about youth involved in the juvenile justice system. Developed for OJJDP by the National Center for Juvenile Justice, the SBB provides timely and reliable answers to questions OJJDP most frequently receives from media, policymakers, and the general public.
